Faculty Writing Groups



Benefits:

- Cultivate community
- Offer dedicated time for research (one-hour/week)
- Opportunity for peer mentoring and exchange of ideas across fields/disciplines

Group Design:

- 4-6 participants
- We *try* to accommodate faculty preferences (faculty of color, women, LGBTQIA+, parents of small children)
- When possible, groups do not have faculty from the same department/school to encourage open dialogue and interdisciplinary connections.
- Writing groups are held in the fall, spring and summer terms.

Structured Writing Groups



- Senior faculty will serve as facilitators, who will meet with a group of faculty for an hour a week over 9 weeks via Zoom.
- Facilitators will start the hour with a mini-lesson/overview for the first 15 minutes on a topic related to writing a specific type of writing project.
 - Fall 2022: STEM articles, book proposals
 - Spring 2023: NIH grant proposals, humanities articles
 - *part of NSF ADVANCE grant
 - Each week will build on one another.
- For most of the hour (45 minutes), faculty will write together, with facilitators staying on Zoom with the faculty participants to help with accountability and/or to answer questions.
