Dear Friends and Colleagues,

Kind greetings and welcome back to another semester at Loyola! We have set a wonderful calendar for the coming year and our Hank Center team is truly excited to bring an excellent array of programs and events from farm to table. From marking the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's 95 theses this fall to marking 50 years since the globally convulsive year of 1968 in the spring, CCIH continues to provide programming that expands scholarship, advances engagement, and deepens appreciation for the Catholic intellectual and artistic heritage.

Three events to highlight in this newsletter. We begin the fall term on September 28 with another installment in our "Catholicism in Dialogue" series. *I Was a Stranger: Student Stories of Religious Hospitality* is a timely colloquium that seeks to integrate the moral heart of religious identity with the political challenges of cultivating the common good. On the Feast of St. Francis (October 4), CCIH welcomes author and entrepreneur Aaron William Perry who has organized a session called *Sacred Sustainability: Life Hacking a Living Tradition*. Aaron's hands-on workshop will bring to life many of the principles celebrated in Pope Francis's landmark encyclical *Laudato Si*. On October 18, CCIH welcomes a broad array of Christian thinkers and leaders to *That We May All Be One: Reformation and the Spirit of Christian Unity.* We mark the 500th anniversary of Luther's famous "post" with a day-long symposium that examines historic divisions that emerged from Reformation controversies-- as well as points of theological, cultural, and pastoral unity among Christians.

We also begin year four of the *Teilhard de Chardin Fellowship in Catholic Studies*. Funded through the generosity of the Loyola Jesuit Community, this endowed chair is a semester-long fellowship for scholars and artists from across the disciplines whose work intersects with the rich intellectual, artistic, and historical tradition of Roman Catholicism. This fall, we welcome fiction writer, Uwem Akpan. In addition to teaching a course on writing, Mr. Akpan will also deliver his much anticipated *Teilhard* lecture on November 9.

Finally, there is an empty chair at CCIH. After five years of stellar service as Director of CCIH, Fr. Mark Bosco, SJ, has accepted

a post at Georgetown University. While we will miss Fr. Bosco's creativity, collegiality, and quick laugh, we wish him all the best. It's good to know that CCIH has a friend in Washington DC.

I encourage you to attend as many events as you can as most are free and open to the public, and to check out the books on our recommended reading list. Also, please visit our <u>webpage</u> regularly as we begin another year of engaging, interrogating, and celebrating Roman Catholic thought and culture at Loyola University.





On October 31, 1517, Reverend Father Martin Luther, Master of Arts and Sacred Theology, and ordinary lecturer therein at Wittenberg, posted 95 theses on the door of the Castle Church. The door functioned as a bulletin board for various announcements related to local academic and church affairs. However, due in large part to the recent invention of the printing press, this "post" was "heard around the world" in a relatively short time. To mark the 500th anniversary of the Reformation-and to place the events in conversation with the Catholic Reformation-CCIH has invited Christian thinkers and leaders to discuss not only the historic divisions that emerged from the reformation controversies, but also, and more importantly, to explore points of shared theological, cultural, and pastoral concerns. This event will conclude with a 16th century setting of vespers and features Martin Marty, Jon Sweeney, Susan Ross, Robin Lovin, Aana Vigen, Jon Nilson, John Armstrong, Craig Mueller, Ellen Wondra, John Paul Salay, and more.





ANDALUSIA IN ANDALUCIA

An International Conference on Flannery O'Connor

This past summer, the Hank Center, along with Universidad Loyola Andalucía, held an international



conference on the American short story writer and novelist Flannery O'Connor (1925-1964). Andalusia in Andalucía focused on engaging the literary vision of O'Connor's stories and the critical reception of her work in light of Spanish Baroque aesthetics, the literary grotesque, and the Catholic imagination. The conference featured a riveting plenary address by Mexican-American author Richard Rodriguez, as well as an insightful and personal speech by the renowned Spanish novelist, poet, and critic Andrés Trapiello.

The conference also hosted an energetic round table discussion between Gretchen Dobrott, Esther Navío and Cristina Sánchez-Andradeon on the subject of translating O'Connor into Spanish, and featured a full complement of paper and panel presentations given by international O'Connor scholars. Southern hospitality was alive and well in Andalucía as the leadership of Universidad Loyola Andalucía organized several superb excursions for conference attendees: up close and personal visits to historical and cultural sites in Andalucía and Córdoba, many beautiful meals, and excellent fellowship. Age of Anger: A History of the Present (2017)

By Pankaj Mishra

Mishra takes a long look at the origins of the great wave of paranoid hatreds that bewilder and terrify us in today's world. Exposing how the promises of modernity-freedom, prosperity, stability-represent broken promises for all but global elites, Mishra explores how those excluded have become increasingly susceptible to demagogues. While not a text in the Catholic intellectual tradition, Mishra takes the religious dimension seriously and questions secularism with insight and alacrity.

The Ninth Hour: A Novel (2017)
