Public Health (PUBH) Courses - Fall 2019

PUBH 300, Introduction to Public Health, Class #6830 (2nd Year or 3rd Year students) 8/26/19 – 12/14/19; Julie Darnell, PhD plus team of Public Health Science faculty Public health is the science of preventing disease and protecting and promoting the health of populations and communities. Through interactive exercises and application of concepts, this course considers its history; ethical principles; scientific foundation and tools; biomedical bases; socioeconomic and behavioral factors; environmental issues; and relationship to medical care.

PUBH 301, Health and the Environment, Class #6835 (2nd Year or 3rd Year students) 8/26/19 – 12/14/19: Justin Harbison. PhD

This course is designed as an introduction to the field of environmental health, including regulations, research, disease prevention, and advocacy.

Featured Profile

Justin Harbison, PhD Parkinson School of Health Sciences & Public Health



An Assistant Professor at Loyola Chicago since 2007, Justin Harbison's research has focused on mosquito control in Kenya, California, Illinois, and elsewhere as he seeks to discover how to reduce mosquito numbers and cases of human disease, and what policies and procedures need to change to help the cause. Given that many urban mosquitoes breed in catch basins, storm water retention ponds, and other parts of sewage systems, Justin earned the nickname "Sewer Monster" for the time he spends in sewers.

Regarding the value of our new B.S. in Public Health, Justin feels the program will give students a broad basis in public health that will allow them to pursue their interests in improving the health of others in many different ways.

This fall Justin teaches our PUBH 301 Health and Environment course and will be co-teaching PUBH 300 Introduction to Public Health. For more information on Justin's work: PUBLICATIONS.
